

The project will replace 220 linear feet of sewer line, replace 260 linear feet of storm sewer line, install 4 catch basins, replace 320 linear feet of waterline, repair 660 linear feet of historic brick roadway, and replace 1,443 linear feet of sidewalk. The project will benefit 6,675 individuals, 64 percent of whom are LMI. The total project cost of \$648,048 includes \$60,000 from the city's PY 2016 Allocation program and \$288,048 in leverage and in-kind match from the city.

	Project Description:	Trumbull County will assist Weathersfield Township with street improvements. The project will replace one bridge. The project will benefit 2,555 individuals, 52 percent of whom are LMI. The total project cost of \$520,000 includes \$175,000 from the county's PY 2016 Allocation Program and \$75,000 in local leverage.

	Project Description:	Miami County will complete water facility improvements in Bradford Village. The project will replace 1250 linear feet of 8-inch water main with 12-inch water main, and install 3 fire hydrants. The water line, which was constructed in the 1960s, has failed in multiple locations. The line runs from the water treatment plant to the water tower and impacts the entire village; population 1676, 1027 (61%) of which are low- and moderate-income (LMI). Miami County will leverage \$40,000 in Allocation Program funds and \$16,000 from Bradford Village.

	Project Description:	Paulding County will assist the Village of Grover Hill with infrastructure improvements along Main Street. The project will include the replacement of 2,000 linear feet of storm drainage, the replacement and installation of 3,100 linear feet of sidewalks, the installation of eight culverts, the repaving of 1,900 linear feet of Main Street, and the installation of 3,500 linear feet of curbs. The project will benefit 435 individuals, 67 percent of whom are low- and moderate-income. The \$955,900 project will leverage \$10,000 from the PY 2016 Community Development Allocation Program and \$645,900 from the village.

	Project Description:	Paulding County will assist the Village of Paulding with 13,500 linear feet of full depth pavement replacement along Perry, Cherry, Emerald, Caroline, Harrison, Jackson and Walnut streets. The streets are major thoroughfares or main connector streets used by all of the residents in the village. The project will benefit 3,895 individuals, 53 percent of whom are low- and moderate- income. The \$925,000 project will include \$10,000 in leveraged funds from the PY 2016 Community Development Allocation Program and \$615,000 from the village.

	Project Description:	Mercer County will assist the Village of Montezuma with the reconstruction of 6,100 linear feet of streets. The \$505,000 project will leverage \$97,000 from the PY2016 Community Development Allocation Program, \$21,500 from the county's Revolving Loan Fund, and \$86,500 in village funds.

	Project Description:	Clinton County will install 1723 linear feet of storm sewer, 14 catch basins, and 7 manholes in Sabina Village. The improvements will take place on Jefferson Street, which includes the municipal building, library, and post office. The storm sewer has collapsed in several places, resulting in standing water in the summer and hazardous icy conditions in the winter. The project, which also includes replacement of a failed railroad crossing, will serve 2327 residents, 1622 (70%) of which are low- and moderate-income (LMI). Clinton County will leverage \$40,000 in Allocation Program and \$19,266 in Sabina Village funds.

The project will serve as the storm sewer outlet for the Ream Street Area which is an approximate 45-acre drainage area. The project will benefit 329 individuals, 71 percent of which are LMI. The total project cost is \$412,200 which includes \$25,600 in funds from the Allocation Program, \$14,400 from the County's ED RLF, and \$72,000 from the village water fund as leverage.

	Project Description:	The City of Zanesville will make storm water and drainage management improvements to Muskingum Avenue, a major thoroughfare and local connector between two federal routes, US 40 and US 22/SR 60. The project includes the installation of 1200 LF curb and gutter and eight catch basins. The project will benefit 25,280 individuals, of which 57% are low- and moderate-income (LMI). The project will leverage \$78,000 from the City of Zanesville.

	Project Description:	Vinton County will replace 4200 linear feet of sidewalk along two main thoroughfares in McArthur Village. The project will benefit the entire Village population of 1480, 1110 (75%) of which are low- and moderate-income (LMI), including a multi-family housing complex. Many of the residents are elderly, do not have cars, and walk to obtain groceries and other household supplies. Vinton County has committed \$25,900 from its CDBG Economic Development Revolving Loan Fund as leverage.

	Project Description:	The City of Piqua will install 140 linear feet of 48-inch storm sewer to improve drainage in the Shawnee Neighborhood. The sewer will run west along Second Street from Cleveland Street through the Great Miami River levee to the river. These improvements will alleviate excess storm water that collects on Cleveland Street and support pump station improvements installed in the area in 2008. The project will benefit 1047 neighborhood residents, 726 (69 percent) of which are low- and moderate-income (LMI). The City of Piqua will provide leverage funds in the amount of \$107,505 and also commit \$30,000 from its PY 2016 Allocation.

	Project Description:	The City of Wooster will use the funds to replace poorly functioning traffic control systems on Liberty Street. The improvements include the replacement of five traffic control devices and sidewalk improvements at five intersections. The project is in an area designated as blighted by the City. The project will benefit 24,495 persons. Forty-three percent of the beneficiaries are low- or moderate-income. The project will leverage \$445,500 in city, RLF, and Allocation Grant funds.

	Project Description:	Portage County will assist the City of Ravenna with street improvements, flood and drainage improvements, and sidewalk improvements. The project will install 500 linear feet of storm sewer and 19 catch basins, 6,400 linear feet of curb, 31 curb cuts, 11 street lamps, 3,500 linear feet of sidewalk, and 8,200 square feet of concrete aprons. The project will benefit 3,375 individuals, 59 percent of which are LMI. The total project cost of \$473,731 includes \$173,731 in local leverage.

	Project Description:	Clark County will assist the City of New Carlisle to reconstruct Prentice Drive. The project will include replacing two catch basins, and installing 28 feet of 12-inch storm pipe, approximately 1440 linear feet of curb and gutter, and 720 linear feet of pavement. The project will benefit 109 individuals, 63 percent of whom are LMI. The total project cost is \$316,500 which includes \$126,000 in funds from the Allocation Program and \$20,000 from the city's street levy as leverage. The Allocation funds were committed in the city's Allocation application.

The \$115,400 project will include \$15,400 in leveraged funds from the village.

	Project Description:	Henry County will assist the City of Napoleon with the replacement of four fire hydrants and 2115 linear feet of waterline. The line is over 100 years old, experiences breaks, and provides inadequate fire pressure. Additionally, some of the city line may include lead, which could impact the water quality. The project will benefit 420 individuals, 58 percent of whom are low- and moderate-income. The \$320,000 project includes \$20,000 in leveraged funds from the PY 2016 Community Development Allocation Program.				
20	Adams County Commissioners	Critical Infrastructure	\$300,000	\$1,199,000	46.5	Funded
	Project Description:	Adams County will replace the Graces Run Road bridge in Oliver Township. The bridge was constructed in 1930 and has outlived its 80-year useful life expectation. The "Sharp S-Curve" configuration and narrow width do not allow for safe semi-truck navigation; trucks have become wedged in the bridge or tipped over with a 20-foot drop to the creek. County residents must also detour when accidents close the bridge for extended periods. A 2015 inspection identified deck and rail system deterioration, and collision damage. The bridge and roadway approaches will be straightened, widened, and realigned. The \$365,000 project will benefit 1510, 835 (55.29%) of which are low- and moderate-income (LMI), residents of Oliver Township. The Adams County Engineer's Office will provide \$65,000 in leveraged funds. Coordinating funds from a variety of sources will assist with related road improvements.

	Project Description:	Coshocton County will assist the Village of Nellie with street improvements. The county will replace one bridge on County Road 41. The project will benefit 115 individuals, 56.5 percent of whom are LMI. The total project cost of \$89,500 includes \$6,200 committed from the county's PY 2016 Allocation Program. This leverage was included only in the county's Allocation application.

The project will leverage \$185,000 in private funds for building rehabilitation projects, \$13,523 in city funds, and \$135,000 from the Allocation Program. The Allocation leverage appears in the city's Allocation application.

Project Description:		Preble County will assist the Village of Lewisburg with a Downtown Revitalization Program. The county will assist in the repair of 15 building facades; the installation of 550 square feet of decorative brick pavers, two traffic light poles, and ten decorative planters; and the replacement of six fire hydrants and 890 linear feet of sidewalk. The project will benefit 2005 individuals, 43 percent of whom are low- and moderate-income. The project will leverage \$227,500 from the PY 2016 Community Development Allocation Program, village funds, Lewisburg Chamber of Commerce, and a grant from the DP&L Community Foundation.				
3	Henry County Commissioners	Downtown Revitalization	\$300,000	\$290,000	64.6	Funded
Project Description:		Henry County will assist the Village of Deshler with a Downtown Revitalization Program. The county will assist in the repair of 15 building facades and the replacement of 2,665 linear feet of sidewalks in Village Park in the Central Business District. The project will benefit 1,635 individuals, 49.9 percent of whom are low- and moderate-income. The \$589,950 project includes \$290,000 in leveraged funds from the PY 2016 Community Development Allocation Program, local funds, and private funds from participating building owners.

Project Description:		Guernsey County will assist the City of Cambridge with the rehabilitation of 15 buildings in the Central Business District target area. The total project cost is \$573,500, including \$23,500 from the city's Revolving Loan Fund and matching commitments from building owners.

Project Description:		Medina County will assist the City of Wadsworth implement a Downtown Revitalization Program. The proposed project will assist the owners of 22 buildings address code violations and to make improvements to their building facades. The project will leverage \$370,000 in private and RLF funds. 20,965 persons will benefit from this project. The city is 27% low- and moderate-income. The project was qualified under the slum and blight national objective.

Project Description:		Trumbull County will assist the Village of Lowellville with a comprehensive downtown revitalization program in the village's Central Business District. The city will also be conducting sidewalk improvements, street improvements, parks and recreation improvements, and parking improvements in the Central Business District in conjunction with the private rehabilitation project. The project qualifies under the slum and blight national objective and will benefit the village population of 1,155. The project includes leverage and coordination of \$1,109,405 from various sources, including the county's PY 2016 Allocation Program, ODOT, and OPWC. The village will also be conducting a \$28,000 public rehabilitation activity which is not included in the scope of work for the Downtown Revitalization Program.

Project Description:		Erie County will assist the City of Vermillion to implement a downtown revitalization program. The project will leverage \$220,000 in private funds.

Water facility improvements include the replacement of waterlines on Kansas Avenue and along 11th Street between Michigan and Indiana Avenues, and the replacement of 8 fire hydrants throughout the neighborhood. Flood & drainage facility improvements include the installation of 1500 LF of new storm drainage along 11th Street, and the installation of 5 new catch basins throughout the neighborhood. Street improvements include repaving 1500 LF of 11th Street, 850 LF of Exline Road from Newman Lane to Kansas Avenue, and 1280 LF of S. Ohio Avenue. The City of Wellston will demolish 4 deteriorated structures in this neighborhood. The project will benefit 1829 individuals, of whom 52% are LMI. This project will leverage \$12,000 from the PY 2016 CDBG Allocation funds and a total of \$208,602 from the City of Wellston, Jackson Cnty. Metro. Housing and local funds.

	Project Description:	Perry County will assist the Village of Roseville with improvements to streets, a community center, flood and drainage, fire protection facilities and equipment, and parks and recreation facilities. Approximately 600 LF of Brush Creek Road will be repaved. Fifty sound barriers will be installed at the Roseville Community Center. There will be installation of 22 catch basins along Main Street. A fire truck will be purchased for the fire department. Also, the community pool will be converted into a new splash pad. There will also be installation of 1500 LF of walking trail around the existing skate park. The project will benefit 1855 individuals, of which 63% are LMI. The project will leverage \$17,500 from PY 2016 CDBG Allocation funds, \$373,800 from the Village of Roseville, \$100,000 from the Capital Grant Program, \$19,500 from the Dept. of Health and \$2,000 from ODNR.

	Project Description:	Shelby County will use funds to make several improvements in the Village of Jackson Center. One project will create nine athletic fields, a new 838 square foot parking lot, and a paved 1,500 linear foot walkway that surrounds the fields. Another project will make improvements to the village's infrastructure: 1,800 linear feet of streets will be repaved, 700 linear feet of water lines and one water valve will be replaced, 12 curbcuts will be installed, 3100 linear feet of deteriorated sidewalks and curbs will be replaced, 10 culverts and 1,600 linear feet of storm sewer line will be installed, and one utility pole will be relocated. The project will benefit 1369 individuals, 55 percent of whom are low- and moderate-income. The project will leverage \$863,000 from the PY 2016 Community Development Allocation Program, village funds, and private funds.

	Project Description:	Logan County will assist the Village of DeGraff with the proposed project activities throughout the village limits. The project will install 600 linear feet of curbing along the East side of South Main Street, install two additional catch basins and 144 linear feet of storm drain along Main Street. It will also reconstruct 671 linear feet of the street, install new drainage and utility lines and replace 671 linear feet of curbing along Bogg Street. Additionally, the project will repave 3,900 linear feet of roadway along multiple streets within the village, upgrade the waste water treatment plant, install new playground equipment, replace roofing on two shelter houses, add 17,700 square feet of parking in the local park and demolish one blighted property. The project will benefit 1145 individuals, 56 percent of whom are LMI. Also, 2315 LF of new sidewalks will also be constructed along the north side of Lakeshore Drive. Storm drainage improvements will also be made along Maple Road including 800 LF of new conduit and the installation of five catch basins. Improvements at the Fairfield Beach Family Park will include 1600 LF of waking path. A new parking lot, located at corner of Alder and Cedar Roads, will also be constructed. The parking lot will be 9000 sq. ft. in size and will accommodate parking spaces for 25 to 30 vehicles. The project will benefit 1380 individuals, of whom 54% are LMI. The project will benefit 445 individuals, 55 percent of whom are low- and moderate-income. 	Project Description:	Morgan County will assist the Village of Stockport to make several improvements. Water facility improvements include updating two fire hydrants and replacing 2,500 LF of waterline on Main Street. Over 200 new street signs will be installed throughout the village to update and adhere to state and federal guidelines.
